

"F&THER FORGIVE THEM"

Can you by an eye of faith imagine what it might have been like in Jerusalem on that fateful Friday? What would it have been like to have been brought under the spell and the excitement of the hour? There were three prisoners about to pay the death penalty. One was a young prophet and two were revolutionists. The crowd on hand that day, with a love of the gruesome, wanted a show

On the way to the cross that day, Jesus had endured untold agony. He had gone through the mockery of a trial and had been scourged. A scourging was a beating so severe that many men did not survive it, and yet Jesus survived it to go to the cross. He had endured the crown of thorns and then the pain of the crucifixion itself. Can you feel the tearing of the flesh as they drove the nails through his hands and the spike through His feet.

Had we endured what Jesus endured that day, would the first words we uttered from the cross have been a prayer? Luke records for us that Jesus said, "Father forgive them; for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34) At such a desperate time, Jesus prayed. Yet, this should not come as a surprise to us as this was his habit from youth. Naturally, Jesus would pray in this black and desperate hour.

There are those who refuse to pray when the sea of life is smooth who generally no longer refuse when there is a tempest brewing. In our need and despair we cry "Lord help me."

Yet, this was not the nature of Jesus prayer from the cross. He did not pray for his deliverance. He did not pray that his friends and loved ones be cared for and comforted. At that desperate time, in his pain and agony, Jesus prayed for his enemies. He put into practice what he had preached on a certain hill when he delivered the "Sermon On The Mount" Jesus prayed for the forgiveness of those who had wronged him. My friends, one of the great roadblocks to the power of the church is the lack of forgiveness among the people of God. We hold grudges, we nurse old hurts and have malice in our hearts. Jesus taught and lived the opposite of that way of life.

In asking for forgiveness for them, Jesus was asking the best for his murderers. You see, forgiveness means far more than release from a penalty. An executive may pardon and refuse to exercise punishment. When God pardons, he does far more than refuse to punish us. He forgives us.

Forgiveness is not a way of escape from consequences. The Bible clearly teaches if we sow tares, we will reap tares. In hot blood David was guilty of adultery. In cold blood he was guilty of murder. His faithful minister took his life in his hands rebuking David. When Nathan called his sin to his attention, David might have come to hate the physician. Instead, he clutched at God's skirt and prayed "have mercy on me". We must be mindful that though forgiveness of David was full and complete, it did not save David from the terrible consequences of his sin.

Forgiveness is a restoral of fellowship. When God forgives and pardons us, He befriends us as if we had never sinned. He forgets our ugly past. He walks with failures as if they had never failed.

Jesus said, "Father forgive them, they know not what they do." On the surface he seems to be pleading for extenuating circumstances. However, Jesus was not seeking to excuse their sin. Like folks today, they knew they were doing wrong. Pilate was so aware it was wrong, he tried to wash his soiled hands. Judas realized the enormity of his sin and hurried to empty his dirty hands of blood money. Annas, Caiphas and the others, none of them could plead "not guilty".


Well, in what sense were they ignorant? In what sense were they unaware of what they were doing? They could not realize just how great their guilt. Forgive them, for they need forgiveness so desperately. Forgive them, they have committed a sin that is black beyond all their realization. Actually, this is true of every sin we commit. We can never know what harvest we and others may have to reap because of one wrong decision or of one deed of disloyalty.

Why is it that we (you and I) find forgiveness so hard? No one has treated us the way Jesus was treated. We haven't been beaten, spit on or crowned with thorns. We have not been wronged in the way that He was wronged. We need to follow the Christlike example of forgiveness. We need to remember Jesus' words in Matthew 7:12, "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you do ye even so to them. If we would be forgiven, we must follow the example of Jesus and forgive others.

If Jesus, hanging on the cross can pray, "Father forgive them, they know not what they do" we should be able to forgive those who have wronged us.

When Jesus walked the dusty roads of Palestine, he had the ability to see more than just the veneer that people offered for the rest of the world to see.
