

RESCUE THE PERISHING

In the Gospel according to Mark, chapter 5 and verses 1 through 20, we find an interesting story in the life of Jesus. It comes after Jesus has stilled the tempest. Jesus and the disciples are on the other side of Galilee.

There, Jesus is approached by a poorly dressed homeless man. He was covered with the tattoos of that day and time. He was crude and lacking in social skills. He was so violent he could not be subdued with chains. This man would have been scary.

He was not someone who would have been a good candidate to invite to Sunday School. Yet, this was the type of person Jesus appealed to. Jesus loved all men. He also loved the rich and powerful. There was Nicodemus, the young ruler and the centurion to name a few. You see, Jesus gave time and attention to all who came to Him.

Jesus has a big welcome for the broken dregs of society. This man they met wanted to travel with Jesus. Jesus told him to go and tell his family. He began to tell in Decapolis what Jesus had done for him. This was actually an area of ten cities in that region.

Just look at the impact Jesus always had on those who were broken in life. There was the Samaritan woman that day at Jacob's well. Early one morning, a woman was dragged in front of Jesus by the Pharisees. They had caught her in adultery. Jesus told those self-righteous men that the one without sin should start by casting the first stone. They dropped their stones to the pavement and went away. Jesus told her to go and sin no more. Like Jesus did in His day, we have a responsibility to the broken of society. All of us are just "jars of clay" and God has His great treasure in jars of clay.


When you think of writers of gospel songs, Fanny J. Crosby often comes to mind. She has often been called the queen of gospel writers. She actually did not begin writing gospel songs until she was 44 years old, which would have been about 1864.

Yet, from her pen flowed more than 8,000 hymns. One of those was written in 1869. Fanny Crosby was with a group of blue collar workers in Cincinnati, Ohio. It was summertime and in the rescue mission the weather was hot. A young 18 year old boy approached her and told her he had not been living the way he promised his mother he would when she had died.

When Fanny Crosby returned to her room that night, she couldn't get that young boy off her mind. The words that became that song kept flooding her mind. The very next day, Howard Doan set the words to music.

It is a song that we do not sing very often in our modern day and time. After all, the words and music are not "contemporary". It is not a song popular with

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young people at youth devotionals or summer youth camp. It is not a 7-11 song (a song with seven words sung 11 times). Yet, it is a song filled with meaning and an important message for the church of the 21st century. We should sing it and sing it more often. We should listen to the words, let them soak in to our hearts and live them out in our lives. Carefully meditate on these words:

Rescue the perishing. Care for the dying. Snatch them in pity from sin and the grave. Weep o'er the erring one, lift up the fallen. Tell them of Jesus the mighty to save.

Tho' they are slighting Him, still he is waiting. Waiting the penitent child to receive;

- Plead with them earnestly, plead with them gently, He will forgive if they truly believe.
- Down in the human heart, crushed by the tempter, Feelings lie buried that grace can restore;
- Touched by a loving hand, wakened by kindness, Chords that were broken, will vibrate once more.

Rescue the perishing, duty demands it; Strength for thy labor the Lord will provide; Back to the narrow way, patiently win them. Tell the poor wand'rer a Savior has died. Rescue the perishing. Care for the dying Jesus is merciful, Jesus will save.

This song served as a prelude to Fanny Crosby's second career. At about the age of 60 she began working in downtown rescue missions. She spent several days a week in lower Manhattan. She would try and help those who were "down and out"

Despite her fame as a hymn writer, she chose to live in near poverty in the ghettos of New York. The Bowery was just a few blocks from her little apartment and was a haunt for alcoholics. It was a place where every type of vice flourished.

Fanny J. Crosby would go there day after day to rescue the perishing. If we want to be like Jesus, we will have a special welcome for the broken of society. We will also, like the homeless man who came to Jesus, seek to tell others. We too will seek to rescue the perishing.
