LOVE THE LORD THY GOD

Matthew records for us an interesting incident that took place during Jesus' last public ministry in Jerusalem. In the temple court, a Pharisaic Lawyer asks Jesus a legal question in Matthew 23:36. He wants Jesus to tell him the great commandment in the law. Now, bear in mind that this was not a question that was asked in a friendly and cordial spirit.

In the answer to the question, Jesus gives an admirable summary of our duty towards God and our fellowman. Jesus says, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul and with all thy mind" then he further states; "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" (Matthew 23:37, 39) Those two rules are so very simple and at the same time so comprehensive.

Love is the grand secret of true obedience to God. Yet, when we think of our love for God, how do we measure it, what proves our love for God? How do we treat those whom we love?

One of the things we do is seek the presence of that person we sincerely love. When we love someone, we want to spend time with that person, we want to be where they are. Do we have a burning desire to be where God is? Do we seek the company and fellowship of God? The Psalmist would state, "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord." (Psalms 122:1) Is that our attitude when it comes time to assemble at God's house on the Lord's day? If not, then perhaps we are only giving lip service to God when we say that we love Him.

In order to express our love, we present gifts and presents to the one that we love. Not only do we bring them gifts, we find genuine delight in doing so. Do we present gifts to our God? Do we honor him with our substance? At the birth of Christ, the Wise

Men came from the east bearing gifts. When Paul wrote the second Corinthian letter, he urged those brethren to abound in the grace of generosity in chapter 8 and verse 7.

We take every opportunity to converse with the individual we love. We talk to them often and we listen while they talk. It is something we look forward to. How often do we converse with our heavenly Father: How often do we talk to God through prayer? How often do we let God speak to us through his word.

Eating and drinking with the object of our love is a great pleasure. Do we always avail ourselves of the opportunity of communing with the Lord? On the first day of every week, the saints of God gather together to partake of the Lord's Supper. Do we have a burning desire to eat with Him and to drink with Him at His table? How often do the flimsiest of excuses keep us from being present with the family of God to participate in this memorial feast?

One of the things we do is try to please the person we love. We don't want to do anything to bring them sorrow or disappointment. We would never do anything intentionally to hurt them. What about God? Are we doing our best to please God? Jesus said, "If ye love me, ye will keep my commandments" (John 14:15) How are we doing with that?

It's Easy To Like People.


